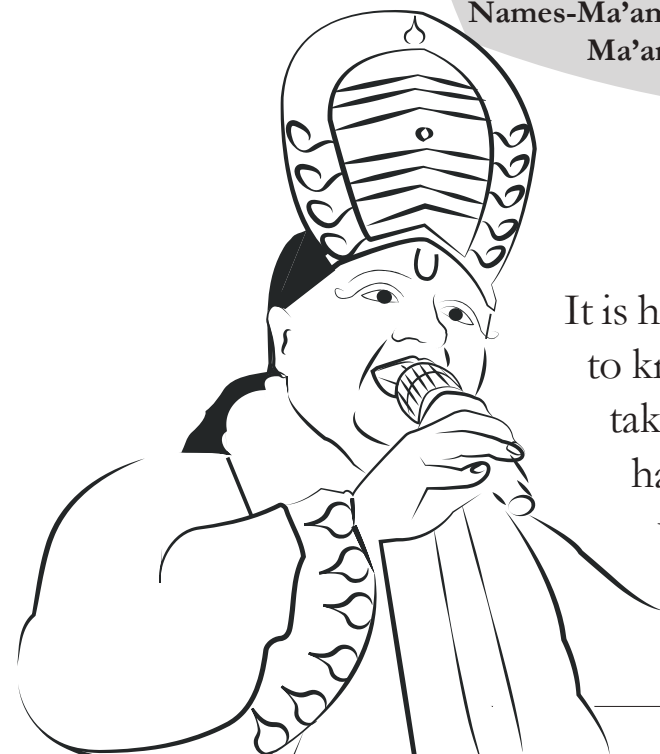

Stepping Stones to your Career

What was your first thought when someone asked you what you want to become when you grow up? From an astronaut to the Prime Minister, all sorts of professions must have crossed your mind. The career fever is spreading across the school, so this article will help clarify your doubts about when, where, how and why a 'proper application process' is required. Middle school students in Grades IX and X might feel that they have sufficient time before they can begin, but they need to realize that it is vital they 'start now'.

In the intermediate years of your life, while working hard for an appreciable matric percentage, you need to start analyzing where your interests lie. Participating in Inter-School competitions, community service and exchange programs will play a crucial role in your college application. It is essential for students of Grade IX to have decided a career related to their interests by now and start taking courses. Analyze your interests, your capabilities and make a strategy. It is imperative you remember that making your passion as your profession, would help you achieve greater heights. However, the fact that the process is more intense than it appears would hit you in Grades XI and XII. This stage in your life can be extremely challenging and will

require consistent hard work in diverse fields. Ensure that throughout this process, you always remember three points:

1. Each opportunity that comes your way has its own purpose. So try your best to experience it to the fullest.
2. Although college applications require time and effort, considering it a burden will only stress you out further.
3. Have faith in your decision. Your teachers and parents may guide you



on the right path, but ultimately you know yourself best.

Here is an outline of the College Application process:

- Discover your interests.
- Choose a stream and find a suitable subject combination.
- Surf the internet for courses that intrigue you.
- Make sure that you look up for colleges that specialize in your course, and not just for high-ranking universities. After all, the best education is what holds the greatest value.
- Follow the entry requirements of

your college, which may vary, on whether you wish to study in India or abroad. Median annual pay: \$63,120

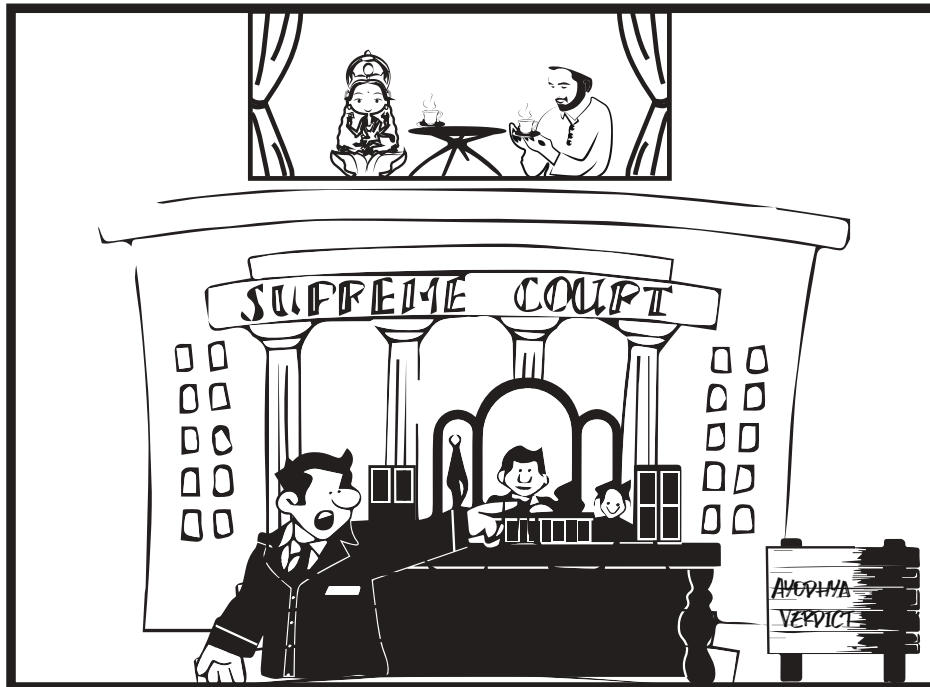
These professionals are responsible for providing data-driven insights to various stakeholders and leveraging information from marketing automation and customer relationship management software, and other business intelligence tools.

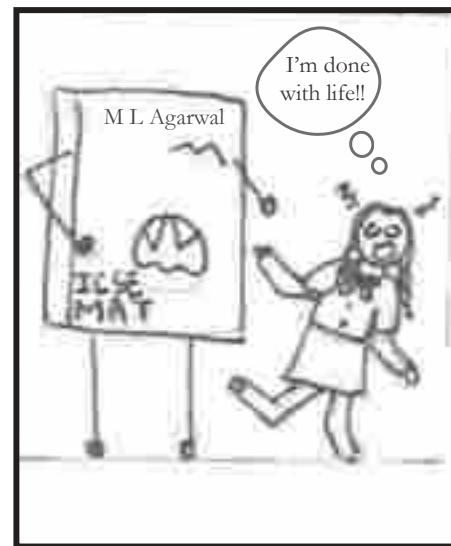
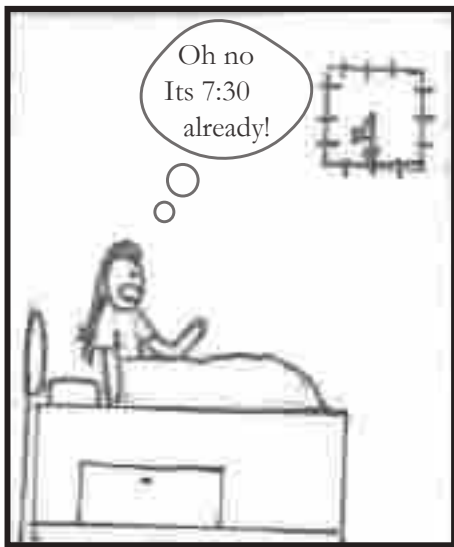

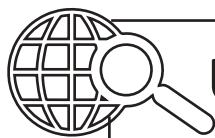
